Homeless Veterans Over Time


904 veterans and 48 of their family members experienced homelessness in North Carolina on one night during the last week of January 2019.

> Using this snapshot from January and data indicating the frequency of new episodes of homelessness, there will be an estimated 2,700 veterans who experience homelessness throughout 2019.

> > Veteran homelessness increased by 4% in one year



A large number of transitional housing beds for veterans in Buncombe county results in a disproportionate rate of veterans experiencing experience homelessness.

unsheltered homelessness decreased by 71% since 2011, but remained flat 2018 -2019. sleeping in sheltered locations

5% chronically homeless

People who are chronically homeless have experienced homelessness for at least a year - or repeatedly - while struggling with a disabling condition such as a serious mental illness, substance use disorder, or physical



52% of homeless vets were African-American

Among North Carolina's larger veteran population, African-Americans are only 22%. This indicates African-Americans experience homelessness at a disproportionate rate.

White: 42%, multiple races: 4%, all other races: 2%
