What is a Point-in-Time Count?

- A count of all homeless people in your community on a single night
- PIT data is useful to:
 - Better understand the characteristics and needs of homeless people in your community
 - Planning and program development efforts
 - Measure progress toward eliminating homelessness and to ensure accountability
 - Raise public awareness



How Does HUD Use PIT Data?

- Data source for the Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR)
 - Information reported in the AHAR is used by Congress, the administration, and the media and general public
- PIT data is published annually on HUD's website
- HUD uses PIT data to inform funding decisions



HUD PIT Requirements

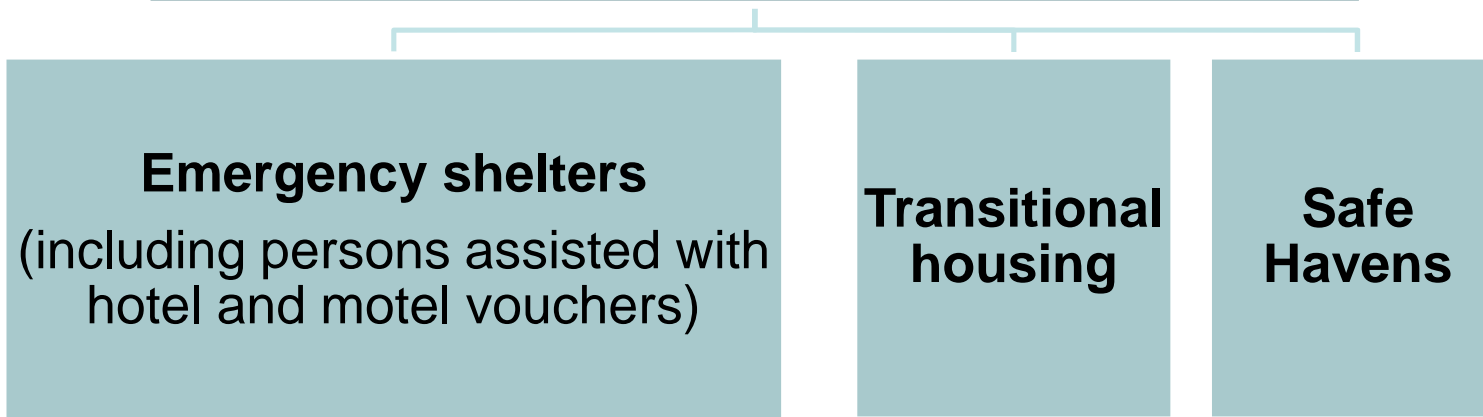
- All CoCs must conduct a PIT count during the last 10 calendar days in January
 - Sheltered counts are required annually
 - Unsheltered counts are required in odd calendar years (2013 is required)
- Both counts must be completed using statistically reliable methods approved by HUD
- CoCs are strongly encouraged to use HMIS to generate their sheltered count where possible



Sheltered PIT Count

- All persons who meet the criteria described in paragraph 1.ii of the Homeless Definition Final Rule

Sheltered homeless persons





Unsheltered PIT Count

- Include all persons who meet criteria described in paragraph 1.i of the Homeless Definition Final Rule

Unsheltered homeless persons

Primary nighttime residence is place not meant for human habitation on night of count, including: car, park, abandoned building, bus or train station, airport, or camping ground



People to NOT Include in PIT Count

Do **not** include people residing:

- in PSH programs (including VASH)
- in locations not listed on the HIC
- temporarily with family or friends
- in their own housing unit with assistance from RRH provider program



Population Data

- Report the total number of sheltered and unsheltered persons and households for three household types:

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Methods for Counting Sheltered Homeless Persons in Rural Areas

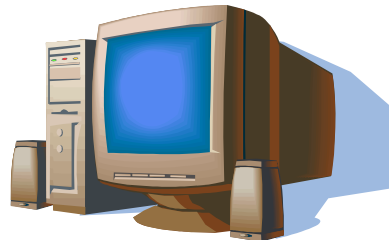
- Count people in emergency shelters, safe havens, and transitional housing programs
 - All programs on CoC's housing inventory
 - Temporary emergency hotel/motel/apartment vouchers for homeless people
 - Faith-based providers and DV providers
 - VA homeless programs and certain programs for homeless youth



Methods for Counting Sheltered Homeless Persons in Rural Areas

- Collect data using:

- HMIS



- Provider report or survey



- Client-level survey using standardized instrument



Sheltered Count – Strategies for Rural Areas

- Online survey instruments can be helpful to overcome data collection challenges in large geographies with few providers
- Hold trainings to ensure that providers understand who to include in the count and how to use the survey instrument (if not using HMIS)



Methods for Counting Unsheltered Homeless in Rural Areas

- Street count plus interviews
 - Complete coverage (block-by-block) and/or known locations
 - Probability sampling
- Service-based count with interviews at non-shelter locations
 - Interview all clients at non-shelter services (i.e. soup kitchens, healthcare centers)
 - Include outreach teams



Unsheltered Count – Strategies for Rural Areas

- Divide large geographies with count coordinators
- Utilize a multi-day data collection effort
 - Conduct service-based count for several days
 - Need to ensure still asking about night designated for the count
- Partner with organizations that may serve homeless persons to promote the count
 - Social service organizations, mental health agencies, community centers, feeding programs, etc.

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Unsheltered Count – Strategies for Rural Areas, con't.

- Identify known locations prior to the night designated for the PIT count
 - Consider engaging currently or formerly homeless individuals to help identify encampment locations
 - Recruit expert volunteers such as law enforcement officials and social service staff to help identify these locations



Unsheltered Count – Strategies for Rural Areas, con't.

- Publicize the PIT count in the community
 - Design and hang posters in common areas publicizing the count date
 - Alerts both the public as well as homeless persons about the upcoming count effort
- Hold trainings for staff and volunteers to ensure they understand who to count and how to use the survey instrument
