[†]The Raleigh/Wake County Continuum of Care collected information only on the total number of people in rapid rehousing and permanent supportive housing programs; it did not collect information on their age, gender, household type, or subpopulation. Because this information is missing, the total number of persons in rapid re-housing and permanent supportive housing in Row 23 will be greater than the sum of the component categories in Rows 1-22. *The number of people who were chronically homeless **before** entering the program.

DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

<u>Homeless</u>

Only people who are **literally homeless** according to HUD's definition should be counted in the Point-in-Time Count. This means that on the night of the count, they are residing:

- In emergency shelter, including domestic violence shelters,
- In transitional housing for homeless persons who originally came from the streets or emergency shelters, or
- In places not meant for human habitation (cars, parks, abandoned buildings, bus/train stations, streets, campgrounds).

Sheltered/Unsheltered

- **Sheltered** homeless persons are residing in emergency shelter (including domestic violence shelters) or in transitional housing for homeless persons on the night of the count.
- **Unsheltered** homeless persons are residing in places not meant for human habitation on the night of the count, such as cars, parks, abandoned buildings, bus/train stations, streets, or campgrounds.

Rapid Re-Housing/Permanent Supportive Housing

People residing in rapid re-housing and permanent supportive housing programs are **not** considered homeless any longer because they are living in permanent housing. Thus, they should **not** be included in the TOTAL column of homeless persons (Column D). However, because the numbers of people and beds in these programs must be reported to HUD in the Housing Inventory Chart, this information is collected during the Point-in-Time Count.

Chronically Homeless

In 2011, the definition of chronically homeless was expanded to include both individuals and families.

- Definition: an unaccompanied homeless individual (18 or older) with a disabling condition **OR** a family with at least one adult member (18 or older) who has a disabling condition who has either been continuously homeless for a year or more OR has had a least four episodes of homelessness in the past three years.
 - The disabling condition can include mental illness, chronic substance abuse, HIV/AIDS, physical disability, or developmental disability.
