General Committee MEETING MINUTES September 17, 2015

Welcome – Chair, Faye Pierce thanked and welcomed everyone for attending. Introductions were made.

Prayer – Marlene said a prayer to begin the meeting.

Meeting Minutes Review/Approval of last meeting – Motion to approve the minutes of the August 20th, 2015 meeting minutes was made by Curtis and seconded by Marlene. Motion passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report & **Coordinated Assessment Report** – Treasurer, Tabitha Cox reported that there were no checks written in Septembet and the balance remained \$2,116.46. Please see the housing report in Attachment A.

Old Business:

Bylaws: The Executive Board will work on updating the bylaws to include the Coordinated Assessment and reviewing them to make sure they are in compliance with the BoS.

BoS Survey: The BoS has asked that all Regional committees complete a survey, to provide input on the possibility of combining some Regional Committees in some format. The Board feels that our committee is strong and can stand alone, but would be willing to help smaller, less established counties. The Board completed the BoS Survey and got the input of the committee on the answer. See attachment B for answers. The survey must be turned in by September 30th. MOTION: Ellery made a motion to except the BoS Regional Committee Capacity Survey with suggested changes noted and Marlene will submit to NC BoS. Motion seconded by Curtis. Approved unanimously by committee.

Coordinated Assessment Toolkit Training: Tabitha did a short training on the Coordinated Assessment Toolkit. Tabitha asked all agencies to do the Prevention and Diversion screening (Emergency Response Screening) within their agency to either prevent homelessness or divert it.

There was a question regarding referrals for Rapid Re-Housing. Those referrals would go to Help, Inc. (domestic violence referrals), Rockingham County Help for Homeless (families and individual referrals).

After the prevention and diversion screening is done there are three agencies in which referrals can be made Help, Inc., Help for Homeless, and Reidsville Housing Authority. These agencies will complete the VI-SPDAT.

It was mentioned that challenges are presented when in order to prevent or divert someone from homelessness all that is needed is a small sum of money or items to contribute to the household they reside in, and there are no specific funding allocations for such. At this point donations are relied on heavily for things such as this.

There was a question regarding Supportive Services Veterans Families (SSVF) for veterans in Rockingham County. SSVF assists veterans with things like deposits or rental assistance. Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) another program that is available for veterans which is similar to Section 8 housing vouchers. DeShanna agreed to look into SSVF and VASH for Rockingham County.

Tabitha continued to discuss the Coordinated Assessment Toolkit by covering the VI-SPDAT tool. It's a scoring system that's fairly easy to follow to add question by question. If you score 5 – 9 you are referred to Rapid Re-Housing and a score of 10 or more is Permanent Supportive Housing.

The tool is great and really works in scoring appropriately for what the client needs. Any agency that comes across a client who is in need of housing can complete the screening and make the necessary referral. There is still a significant need for a shelter in Rockingham County and it will be important to keep making the community aware of the issue, getting donations, fundraising, and grant writing.

The case management assessment piece of the Coordinated Assessment Toolkit is also working well so far. It's been effective at setting goals for clients to develop new life plans.
