Census Logistics

- Different forms for different populations
- Census forms will be mailed to all addresses later this week
- Questionnaire Assistance Centers will open on March 18
- □ Field enumerators will be in the field April July
- Census helpline 1-866-861-2010 open through end of July.



Permanent Supportive Housing & Doubled Up

- These apartments and houses will receive mailed forms.
- Encourage individuals and families to fill out the census form and return it via mail.
- Persons who are doubled-up should be counted on the household's form.
- If forms are not returned, Census workers will begin knocking on doors in late April.





- March 29 31 conducting service-based enumeration
- Census enumerators will be sent to shelters, transitional houses and soup kitchens
- Census workers will ask a series of no more than ten questions
- □ In some cases, administrative records may be used

Unsheltered Count

- □ March 29 31
- Census enumerators will counting persons sleeping outside
- Contact your local Census office and ask about their plans for the unsheltered count
- Offer to assist— your expertise is needed to ensure an accurate street count!

What if your facility does NOT get counted on March 29-31?

- 1. Contact NCCEH at 919-755-4393 or ncceh@ncceh.org
- We'll work with you to try to get a Census worker to come to your site on another day
- Persons can also be counted at Questionnaire Assistance Centers (QACs) beginning March 18th and via 1-866-861-2010 beginning April 23rd



What if your facility does NOT get counted on March 29-31?

- 4. Persons may also be counted by calling the Telephone Questionnaire Assistance Center at 1-866-872-6868.
 - If you prefer a Spanish-speaking operator, then dial 1-866-928-2010
 - The lines will be open from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m seven days a week from February 25, 2010 through July 30, 2010.
- Persons can be counted by calling in begging April 23rd.
- For the hearing-impaired, TDD 1-866-783-2010 (during the times noted above).
