CoC Application Updates

HUD announced Tier 1 FY19 CoC Awards on January 14.

- All Tier 1 projects were awarded
- CoC planning grant was also awarded
- Total initial award: \$8,558,755
- Still waiting for Tier 2 and DV bonus project award announcements

FY2020 CoC Competition has begun and HUD announced the initial steps:

- Registration released January 14; due March 5
- GIW is expected to be released approximately 6 weeks after registration

The Funding and Performance Subcommittee will recommend funding priorities for the 2020 CoC competition.

- The subcommittee began discussing and making updates to the CoC Funding Priorities at its January meeting to cover:
 - Overall CoC priorities
 - Regional component priorities

- The subcommittee will finalize FY20 funding priorities at the February 27 meeting

• The NC BoS CoC Steering Committee will consider the recommended priorities at the March 3 meeting.

- The Intent to Apply process will be reviewed in the New CoC Applicant Webinar.
 - The Intent to Apply form will be posted directly after the webinar.
 - Any agency wanting to apply for a new CoC project in the FY20 competition is required to submit a form.
 - Asks for preliminary information about proposed project(s)
 - NCCEH staff will review and follow-up with the agency to discuss.
 - The Intent to Apply process is done on a rolling-basis and is non-binding.
 - The deadline to submit your Intent to Apply will be 2 weeks after the NOFA release.
 - NC BoS CoC needs agencies to apply for funds that can run effective programs.
 - Regional Committee leadership and at-large members can help recruit agencies to apply that have the following:
 - Capacity to operate CoC programs
 - Best practice knowledge
 - Willingness to serve the most vulnerable people experiencing homelessness

Staff solicited questions or comments. None expressed.

Annual Coordinated Entry Evaluations

The CoC evaluates the coordinated entry system to understand how we are doing and mark areas for improvement.

The first phase of CE evaluation has begun

- HUD requires CoCs to evaluate their coordinated entry process at least annually.
- CoCs must collect feedback from participating programs and clients.

Current CE evaluation framework:

- Two groups surveyed:
 - Service providers
 - o Clients who have interacted with the CE system
- Service providers surveyed via online form, annually.
 - Should receive form in March
- Client surveys distributed to two groups to make it easier for them to participate and to make it easier for the agency to disperse the surveys. The two groups are:
 - People currently experiencing homelessness, after receiving the VI-SPDAT
 - People housed in PSH or RRH programs.



• RRH client surveys distributed on a rolling basis. All other surveys distributed once a year in the spring.

Survey Process

- Surveys are confidential, anonymous, and completely optional.
- Surveys can be completed on paper or online.
- Once a paper survey is complete, client should be given an envelope to seal it in.
- If a client requests help completing the survey, someone who does not have direct contact with the client must provide the help. If that person doesn't exist in your agency, ask another agency to help.
- Read the provided script before each survey.

Directions to staff distributing survey

- 1. Survey is completely optional.
- 2. Completing the survey should be done anonymously.
- 3. Be sure to read the script provided before distributing survey.
- 4. Please put your <u>agency name</u> and <u>date</u> on surveys before handing to the client or before client begins the online survey.
- 5. Provide an envelope with all paper surveys.
 - You should keep a large envelope or a box to collect completed surveys.
- 6. Turn in completed paper surveys to your Coordinated Entry Lead.

2020 Point-in-Time/Housing Inventory Count

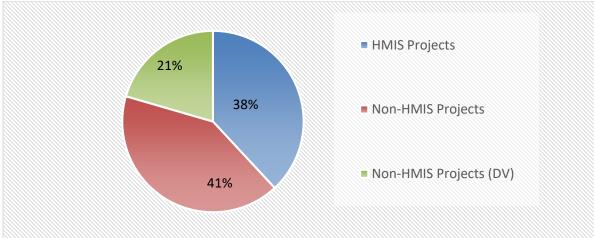
Preliminary results were shown for discussion purposes only. Results shown are solely from the Counting Us App and are incomplete. This is a first look at the results that have come in and there is still much work to be done with the agencies and regions to ensure data is accurate.

2020 Goal: The NC Balance of State CoC will complete an accurate and comprehensive Point-In-Time and Housing Inventory Count in 2020 throughout all of our regions.

- Our count was on January 29, 2020.
- Gives a snapshot of homelessness on a given night.
- Numbers are changing rapidly as they come in

What we are counting

- Beds and units
 - How much capacity does our system have?
- People
 - How many people are experiencing homelessness?
- For the purpose of this presentation, we will be showing numbers for people only



Total Projects

- There are a total estimate of 249 projects reporting.
- 158 of 249 are non-HMIS projects.
 - Some are not allowed to use HMIS because they are a domestic violence agency.
 - Some choose not to utilize HMIS.
- 24% of projects utilized the App

Unsheltered Data

Thanks to the regional PIT/HIC Leads! Staff have been quickly connecting to the PIT/HIC Leads and other volunteers, and it is making the data better!

Street Count and Service-Based Count

- The pros for observation counts are:
 - They provide autonomy and respect to people who do not want to be surveyed or may be otherwise occupied (such as sleeping).
- The challenges for observation counts are:
 - They provide limited information-volunteers must guess if folks are homeless, their age, race, and gender.
 - Observations risk creating duplicated counts people may be observed on the 29th and then get surveyed at a service-based count.

• NCCEH does a lot of complicated math when the observation data is this high, and it gets further from the real experience of persons experiencing homelessness.

Sleeping location

- We can only include people who are *unsheltered*, but all sleeping location information is helpful for local planning.
- We are reviewing responses to ensure that people in programs were not accidentally surveyed using the unsheltered count survey.

Non-HMIS sheltered data for ES, TH, RRH, and PSH

- 28 out of 158 projects have submitted data as of February 4
- 18% submitted via the App



Working with the data

- We've reached out to all agencies to encourage them to use the App.
- Some projects have submitted one or two surveys and still need to enter data.
- The App has linked counties to the wrong regions. We're working to update that now.
- After the App closes, we will work to finalize data and follow-up with agencies that did not use the App.

Staff solicited comments and questions.

- Teena Willis asked if information will be broken out by county and not just region.
 - Amy responded that the data will be broken out by county. Staff will continue to collect and analyze data through February and March, but data should be broken out and released prior to the April deadline to submit data to HUD.

Emergency Shelter Learning Collaborative (ESLC)

The National Alliance to Ed Homelessness (NAEH), through their Capacity Building Center, has been offering the ESLC to communities over the last 2-3 years. NAEH has provided the ESLC to shelters in CT, MI, VA, GA, and other states and CoCs.

- The ESLC technical assistance model emerged as the NAEH traveled and heard about the work that emergency shelters were doing and the struggles many communities were having creating flow in their CE systems. They talked with high-performing shelters across the country that were successful exiting people into permanent to determine the common factors they shared, creating a technical assistance model to assist other shelters to implement these strategies and techniques.
- This is the first time NAEH has worked in the state of NC to provide an ESLC. NCCEH contracted with NAEH to bring the ESLC model to the NC BoS CoC to help emergency shelters in our CoC and give them hands on, sustained assistance as they worked to lower barriers and transition to housing-focused services.
- The ESLC will assist participating shelters to:
 - Understand the essential role shelters play to end homelessness, including the 5 keys to an effective emergency shelter
 - o Implement low-barrier and housing-focused services and techniques
 - Develop short and long-term goals and provide a 100-day challenge opportunity to meet emerging objectives
- NCCEH offered the first ESLC opportunity to Region 5
 - Region 5 has the largest homeless population and could have the greatest impact for the CoC to decrease homelessness.
 - Shelters exist in each of the 5 counties with commitment to using the technical assistance to improve flow through the system.
 - Shelters serve as main access points in the region's CE system.
- Shelters participating in the ESLC:
 - o Union County Community Shelter
 - Esther House
 - Family Services of Davidson County
 - Rowan Helping Ministries



- Crisis Ministry of Davison County
- Family Crisis Council of Rowan County
- Homes of Hope
- Turning Point
- The ESLC will be a year-long intensive technical assistance process

- All meetings will take place in Region 5, and NAEH will be in the CoC multiple times to assist shelters to meet their goals and objectives.
- NCCEH staff and Region 5 shelters will provide updates throughout the ESLC to keep the CoC updated on progress and experience.
- NAEH staff will be training NCCEH staff, using a train-the-trainer approach, on how to run an ESLC with the hope of providing opportunities for other NC BoS CoC shelters to get the same experience and expertise to lower their barriers and provide housing-focused services.

Staff solicited questions or comments. None expressed.

GPD Letter of Support

Grant Per Diem Programs (GPD) are VA-funded Transitional Housing Programs.

- NC BoS CoC received requests for letters of support from 2 agencies
 - Rowan Helping Ministries (serving Region 5)
 - Volunteers of America (serving Regions 6,7,9,10,12,13)
 - Rowan Helping Ministries (RHM)
 - New applicant
 - o 8 Male beds, 1 Female bed, 1 Transitional Apartment for a Veteran Family
 - Serving Rowan County and other counties in the Salisbury VA Medical Center catchment area
 - Rowan Helping Ministries staff explained their housing focused program model and all the services their program will offer veterans.
 - RHM participates in Region 5 as well as the coordinated entry system.

Staff solicited questions or discussion regarding RHM's request for a letter of support.



- Nicole Dewitt stated she could vouch for RHM and all their services. She stated they are a main player in Rowan County and have been instrumental in Veterans' work, such as Rapid Results.
- A motion was made to approve RHM's letter of support for the GPD application [Dewitt, Cox]. All in favor, none opposed. The motion passed by unanimous consent.
- Volunteers of America of Carolinas (VOAC)
 - Renewal applicant for their Maple Court project
 - o 24 beds
 - Serving the Durham VA catchment area
 - VOAC staff described their Maple Court project and all the services their program currently offers veterans.

Staff solicited questions or discussion regarding VOAC's request for a letter of support. None expressed.

• A motion was made to approve VOAC's letter of support for the GPD application [Smith, Martin]. All in favor, none opposed. The motion passed by unanimous consent.

Burlington Development Corporation (BDC) CoC Grant

Burlington Development Corporation has notified the CoC it will not continue its CoC grants after 06/30/20.

- BDC has two active CoC grants:
 - HOPE Permanent Supportive Housing
 - Operating End Date: 06/30/20
 - Not renewed in the FY19 competition not continuing
 - STEPS Rapid Rehousing
 - Operating End Date: 06/30/20
 - Renewed in the FY19 competition continues 07/01/20
 - Will need to be transferred to another agency OR reallocated in the FY20 competition
- STEPS RRH Program:
 - County served: Alamance
 - Budget: \$57,664
 - Units: Minimum 3 units for families with children
 - Grant operating year: 07/01/20 06/30/21
- Per the CoC Significant Change Policy, NCCEH staff will issue an RFP to gauge interest from other agencies willing to take on the renewal grant.
