





### **Dashboard Outcomes Review**

#### Access to Permanent Housing (PH)


- PH Exits = a client/household was enrolled in a homeless dedicated project and left for a permanent destination (no longer receiving services)
- Move-Ins = a client/household began sleeping in a permanent situation but may still be receiving services (only recorded for CE, RRH, and PSH projects)








# The FPS could be helpful in thinking about potential strategies that the SC could consider.

#### The data tells us several things:

- We helped 3,358 individuals or 1,909 households find permanent housing over the last complete year (FY21)
- In that same time, 58 households Moved-On from Permanent Supportive Housing
  - That's about 5 households per month!

#### Where does the system need to put its efforts based on this data?

- Increase Moving On strategies?
- Partnerships to PHAs or Supports after PSH?
- Others?

## Key points of 2022 Membership

- New members should agree with the idea that racism is systemic and impacts all parts of homelessness systems. This includes acknowledgment that disparities in homelessness systems exist because of racism.
- Commit to attend as many monthly RE Subcommittee meetings as possible. Inform staff if you aren't planning to be there.
- Encouraged to serve on workgroups and other subcommittees, either RE Sub or more broadly in BoS CoC.
- Share the responsibility of reporting to Steering Committee. Expect to present at least once in the year.
- Promote and attend RE Subcommittee events, such as the RE Dialogue Series.
- Assist in recruitment of new members as needed.
- One year commitment. No cap on renewing.



## **Equity Initiative Cohort #2**

- NC BoS CoC has begun participation in a national cohort of CoC's attempting to improve equity in their Coordinated Entry systems!
- NC BoS CoC have started meeting with CoC's from across the country and individual sessions with HUD TA to work on improving racial disparities in access and prioritization.
- The Prioritization Work Group of the Racial Equity Subcommittee serves as the core team along with NCCEH staff Andrea Carey and Ashley VonHatten.

#### **Roles for Balance of State**

#### **Unsheltered Access Coordinators**

- Elected position for each region
- Primary goal: goal is to ensure <u>all</u> people living unsheltered connect to services!
- Leads collection, entry, and verification of data for PIT night
  - Organizes verification surveys night-of or immediately after PIT night

### ES, TH, RRH, PSH Program staff

- Confirm point of contact with NCCEH when they reach out this fall
- Ensure information is ready and available for clients served

## The Consumer Advisory Council has a new name!

- The group has decided to rename to avoid using the term "consumer" and will now be the Lived Expertise Advisory Council (LEAC)
- This change has been made internally among the LEAC members
- Steering Committee approval will be needed to make name changes in the governance charter.
- Draft edits to the Governance Charter and a formal proposal will be coming in 2022.



## The LEAC has begun holding meetings

- The LEAC formally launched in October and has held meetings in Oct and Nov.
- Meetings have focused on building a foundation of understanding and relationships, as well as a knowledge base for working in the context of a CoC.



## Participation in HUD TA

- LEAC co-chairs and NCCEH staff participated in Partnering with People with Lived Expertise (PLE) national cohort facilitated by HUD TA.
- NC BoS CoC joined 8 other CoC's from across the country to work on improving the ways that CoC's can incorporate and integrate PLE more fully into strategy and decision making at the CoC level.
- Participation included 1:1 sessions with HUD TA that helped us launch the LEAC and challenged us to think big about its scope of work.
- We anticipate a lot to come from the LEAC in 2022!






## NC BoS CoC Emergency Housing Vouchers Priorities

- 1) Households are ready to Move On with long-term rental assistance but less intensive case management
  - Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) and Rapid Rehousing (Region 7) clients are both eligible for Move On.
- 2) Households with highest length of unsheltered homelessness and where documentation for PSH (chronic homelessness and/or disability) is not able to be obtained.
- 3) Families and/or individuals on current regional Coordinated Entry (CE) by-name list (BNL) who need long-term rental assistance.

#### **CE Lead**

- Main point of contact for the PHA
- Partner with PSH & RRH providers to facilitate moving on referrals
- Filter BNL for priority 2 & 3 during case conferencing
- Complete all EHV referral forms and send to PHA
- Identify a provider point of contact for each household



#### \*PSH Provider with Move On clients

- Discuss moving on with household
- Discuss moving on with landlord (if transitioning in place)
- Complete moving on referral and send to CE Lead
- Support household through application, briefing, housing search, and leasing process

\*RRH for Region 7



#### Provider Point of Contact for EHV household

- Attend Case conferencing
- Provide updates to CE Lead
- Support household through application, briefing, housing search, and leasing process



#### PHA

- Accept referrals from CE Lead
- Comply with all HUD standards
- Conduct Briefing for voucher households
- Support households in housing search process
- Complete HQS
- Enter Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) Contract with Landlord
- May assist with other supportive services



### NC BoS CoC

- Support stakeholders to ensure an effective and equitable EHV process
- Encourage close collaboration between CE System and PHAs
- Available for TA



#### **EHV Household**

- Complete application
- Attend briefing
- Identify housing within 120 days of voucher issuance
- Complete Request for Tenancy Approval (RFTA) with landlord
- Work with assigned service provider as needed



### Landlord

- Accept voucher
- Complete Request for Tenancy Approval (RFTA) with household
- Enter Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) Contract with PHA


