





Unsheltered Homelessness



Food for Thought:

Why do people experience homelessness?



Why might someone stay in an unsheltered situation instead of seeking shelter on their own?



What are some myths or stereotypes about people living unsheltered?



Urban vs. Rural Unsheltered Homelessness

- Rural spaces can make people much harder to find.
- Abandoned barns, mills, storage units, and vehicles may be additional places that people can take shelter.
- Services may be few and far between.
- Impact of misinformation: misconceptions about eligibility or services in addition to lengthy and difficult travel may dissuade someone from seeking shelter or housing support.
- Shelters may not feel safe.



NC BoS CoC Written Standards for Street Outreach

"Outreach programs should meet people where they are, both geographically and emotionally. This means meeting people in locations that are most convenient for them as well as developing trusting relationships with unsheltered people through active listening, persistence, consistency, and without judgement." pg. 2, NC BoS CoC Written Standards for Street Outreach



Meeting People Where They Are (Physically)


- Initial focus on survival and safety: Basic need items, building trust
- Connection to resources: offering transportation (when possible); connecting to food banks, medical/mental health providers; connecting to shelter
- Connection to Housing: CE referrals; connection to RRH and PSH programs
- Visiting campsites/unsheltered locations

Meeting People Where They Are (Emotionally)

- Building rapport and trust
- Responding consistently when called
- Non-prescriptive services; utilize creativity!
- Non-prescriptive timeline
- Outreach is NOT "getting people off the streets"
- Outreach IS being a supportive presence/advocate when your client is ready to navigate shelter/housing



Housing First applies to people experiencing unsheltered homelessness too!






You can't be everywhere at once

- Even if you are operating street outreach programs in your region, you need to rely on your network of providers.
- The most important part of the UAC role is maintaining this network.
- Look to nontraditional services:
 - Food banks
 - Harm reduction org, methadone clinics, etc
 - Public schools (McKinney-Vento liaisons)
 - Hospitals
 - Day labor companies




How could these organizations help?

Each UAC will be mailed a \$100 gift card. The gift cards are intended to connect with people living unsheltered directly or indirectly with the help of volunteers.


Items that might be purchased:

Regional BNL Data




Regional BNL Data

- BoS has **178 households** (previously 210) on the by-name list who have not been updated since 2023 PIT (1/25/2023)
- With 2024 PIT QUICKLY approaching, these households need to be exited NOW.
- These household can be easily identified through the Regional By-Name List


